WHAT IT WAS LIKE, WHAT HAPPENED AND WHAT IT'S LIKE NOW

WHEN I SLUNK into the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous, I thought I mustn't be too bad because I hadn't lost a lot of what I heard others had lost. I never lost my home. I never lost my car. I never lost my job and I never lost my freedom since I'd never been arrested. Those hardships were waiting for me if I continued to drink.

Soon I came to realize, I had lost much more valuable possessions. I lost my self respect. I lost my friends. I lost the trust of my family and I had lost my freedom since I'd been imprisoned by alcohol. I couldn't go anywhere, do anything or engage in any activities without it.

I came to AA totally beaten by my addiction to alcohol. I had spent the last few years, holed up alone in my house drinking daily. I couldn't stop. I tried for months, promising myself, *I won't drink today,* only to be drunk by afternoon. Then in the morning, I'd promise myself again. What a vicious cycle.

So with a hang dog face, I admitted I needed help and called AA. I expected a bunch of glum, boozy hobos sitting around lamenting their messed up lives. What I found was happy, joyous and free, well groomed normal looking men and women who welcomed me and made me feel accepted. I came in with shame and regret weighing me down and the wonderful women of AA took me under their wings and showed me how to live again.

That first year of sobriety, I did everything and went everywhere they told me. I totally immersed myself in AA. I got a sponsor and a big book. I worked the steps as instructed. Even if I didn't like it or believe it, I did it anyway. My sobriety became my first priority. I followed those that came before me. They took me to AA speaker meetings, pot lucks, dances, parties and conventions. I went willingly and had a wonderful time.

Little by little, the fog began to lift and I recognized the person that I was, always looking for something on the outside to fix my insides. Every year or so, I'd move, change my hair style, go on a shopping binge, get a new job, or a new boyfriend.

Then I saw the woman I wanted to become, a sober caring member of society. And to do that, I needed to look inward not outward. I learned that most of my misery was my own doing. I learned how to be grateful for all I had instead of focusing on what I didn't have. I learned how to love and accept others as they are. The process took time and work. But it's well worth it.

My sobriety date is Oct. 10, 1986. I can tell you truthfully that the thirty years of sobriety I have enjoyed are the happiest years of my life.

Volunteers Needed to Correspond with AA's On the Inside

"I have been in and out of jail and now prison since I was 18. I am now 37. I would always leave with the best intentions - to be a good husband, good father, get a job, not drink, and never to return. But I always drank and always returned . . . This time I will be here until 2020 . . . I started to go to the AA meetings that are brought inside, and I feel hopeful . . . Please write back".

So writes an inmate from the California Men's Colony (CMC) in San Luis Obispo –The prison that is on the right hand side as you drive by if you are headed toward Morro Bay. The County Jail sits on the left a few miles up the highway.

In 2016 Bridging the Gap (BTG) in San Luis Obispo County received 36 requests like the one above from male inmates. They come from CMC and our County Jail, and a few from other correctional facilities in California. In most all cases the BTG committee was able provide an AA member to write to them.

So far in the first three months of 2017 we have around 18 new requests for correspondence. Two from the women's jail and the remainder from men.

Bridging the Gap is a service committee of Alcoholic Anonymous. Its basic goal is to connect AA members on the inside with AA members on the outside. In our District 22 it carries two functions. One is for the outside volunteer to meet with the inmate when they are released to show them around to a half a dozen meetings in the area they will be living. The second is to provide a much needed correspondence while the inmate is doing their time. The BTG committee gets more requests for the latter.

How it works is an inmate writes to the Bridging the Gap post office box (The same PO box as our Central Office). The request is forwarded to a volunteer coordinator, to be assigned to a volunteer. The volunteer then writes to the inmate and uses the PO Box address as a return address. The inmate then writes to the volunteer using the PO Box address. You just use your first name and last initial to insure anonymity.

There is a group of around 20 men who volunteer to write to inmates. But through the years a volunteer could be writing up to a half a dozen inmates. New volunteers are always needed. We can also use female volunteers to write to women inmates, but at this time we are more in need of men.



THE TWELVE STEPS OF ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

- We admitted we were powerless over alcohol—that our lives had become unmanageable.
- Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him.
- Made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- Admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
- Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.

- Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- Made direct amends to such people whenever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- 11. Sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
- 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.
