You Are Not Alone

When I came through the doors of AA, I did not plan on staying. Guilt, remorse and shame ruled my life as an alcoholic woman because of the actions I had taken during my 28 years of drinking. Even though some times were fun filled early on, more times than not, I placed myself and my children in a position to be hurt. Their safety was never foremost in my mind as they joined me on a journey that included multiple moves, new schools, moms' new boyfriend (again) and many mornings of screaming, yelling and uncertainty.

A fear filled childhood can take a lifetime to get over, especially when your primary caregiver is an alcoholic mother. I won't say, "I did the best I could," because it would be untrue. My children ate frozen pizza, while I devoured rib-eye steaks. My sons had clothes, food and a roof over their heads. Wasn't that enough?

Writing this today with 14 years of continuous sobriety, I can assure you that Alcoholics Anonymous has given me the dignity and self-respect that had eluded me for many years. Along with sponsorship, it took willingness, honesty and open-mindedness before my life transformed into what I have today. Through working the Steps, applying the Traditions and practicing the Concepts, my foundation today is unshakeable—just like my sponsor promised. But I had to become as willing as only the dying can be. My sponsor helped me to find a Higher Power of my own understanding that has carried me through one day at a time to where I am today.

Unfortunately, I believed, as so many women do, that if I only had the right _____(fill in the blank) man, house, car, amount of money or job—that my life would be fine. After being in the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous for a couple of years and not drinking, I had all those things, but my home life was still a mess. I was still angry, obnoxious and discontent. My oldest son left home 2 weeks after his 18th birthday and my youngest son dropped out of high school to join him.

At four and a half years of my "sobriety", a woman Twelfth-stepped me. That is where my old life ended and my new life began. She promised me happiness, usefulness and a design for living that has transformed my life. My youngest son actually bowed as he thanked her the first time they met. We can laugh about that today. We can laugh about everything today.

For the last 16 years, I have had the same phone number, the same job and have lived in the same city without having to run away from my problems. My oldest son still wanders, sleeping under the stars. My youngest son stays close by. They are living their lives without any interference from me. They both know I'm here and that I will do anything for them—within my power. Alcoholics Anonymous has taught me that to be helpful is my only aim, and that means in AA, at work, in my community and certainly in the lives of my family. My Higher Power gave me a heart of service for which I am very grateful. I'm staying around AA!

I stay for the sons who might need AA and for the women I sponsor. But most of all I stay for the beautiful grandson who has blessed my life in countless ways. All my amends have been made, but the work continues alongside my sponsor. Because of some simple, yet necessary actions on my part, my guilt remorse and shame have been transformed into happiness, joyousness and freedom! Thank you Alcoholics Anonymous! -- Beth F.

events take place at this location, except for the Al-Anon Luncheon, to be held at Madonna Inn. The convention opens on Friday, **August 23, 2019** at 2:00pm; it closes on Sunday, **August 25, 2019**, at Noon.

Most associations like to hold conferences or conventions. However, in AA, a conference or convention is an important opportunity to share the AA experience in a broad way. There are many AA conferences held around the world. One of the most common misconceptions of these gatherings is that they are AA meetings, and since "There are no dues or fees for AA membership..." there should be no fees to attend.

Conventions and conferences are special events, not regular meetings. They require months of planning, preparations, and money to present. Since most events are held in hotels/convention centers, there is a charge for the use of these facilities. Other expenses include travel and lodging for conference speakers, printing of flyers and schedules, postage and supplies. A large event requires a substantial amount of money. This conference/convention is self-supporting. No group monies are used to pay for this event. The cost of the event is paid through registration fees. No baskets are passed. The ideal goal for any committee of such an event is to break even; therefore, the registration fee is nominal compared to a weekend's worth of spiritual events anywhere else. Attendance is voluntary and as responsible AA members, we "pay our own way."

Do you ever wonder what it takes to put on a convention for hundreds of people? Come to the next planning meeting and find out. The Convention is just around the corner and there is much to be done. Be a part of the next chapter in the legacy of our convention and become a volunteer on either the AA or the Al-Anon committee.
