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Trudging the Road of Happy Destiny

Sober hiking helped him rediscover the joys of living

Like so many other alcoholics that I have heard share over the years, I was certain that there would be no joy in my life without booze. I was 35 years old and literally dying from alcoholism. I was resigned to the fact that my life may as well be over. I joined the glum lot in AA and became one of those miserable members that "just don't drink," not fully understanding the necessity of working the Steps, being part of the Fellowship and being of service.

Sometime during my first 30 days in the program, I was attending a meeting down by the beach where I came across a flyer for the "Sunset Beach Trudgers." Here was a sober backpacking group that went on monthly hikes into the wilderness and had a Saturday night meeting in the woods. I had always enjoyed camping and communing with nature, but my physical condition at that time was terrible and I knew there was no way that I would be able to hike up a mountain carrying a pack in that shape. I put the Trudgers out of my mind and continued on my journey for over a year, staying sober one day at a time without having much fun at all.

When my one-year anniversary passed I made a decision to stop smoking and get in shape. This was more an attempt to find a girlfriend than anything else, but my motives never were in the right place. One Wednesday night at my regular meeting, a man whom I had never seen before came in and announced that there was a great group of alcoholics that went on backpacking trips once a month. He gave me a flyer and it was the same one I had seen when I was newly sober. This time I was ready!



The fact that the contact numbers for the Trudgers were all women made it even more compelling. I made some phone calls, borrowed some camping gear and went on my first hike in September 1993. It was the annual trip to Mt. San Jacinto where they take the Palm Springs tram up the mountain and then hiked for two more miles to the campsite. About half way up the trail I realized that I wasn't as athletic as I thought. I was tired and scared and thought maybe this wasn't such a great idea after all. I stopped to rest for a minute and take a drink of water when it happened.

I took a few deep breaths and surveyed my surroundings. There was a meadow in the not so far off distance and I noticed that there was a deer checking me out. It was as if God hit me over the head with a two by four. I was in his back yard and it was breathtaking. I guess what I felt at that moment was the closest thing I had ever known to a spiritual awakening. My fear was gone. I got a second wind and continued up the trail where I found the group of sober alcoholics that would soon become some of my best friends.

In 1995 the position of secretary became open and I took it. Back then, we typed up the trip flyers every month and mailed them out to all our members. It was a lot of work and I did it with complete gratitude for this group that showed me how to have fun without bring drunk. Eventually, when the internet became more accessible to everyone we decided that email would be more efficient and cost effective. Having little or no computer skills, I attempted to build a website. We have been online now for about 10 years. Our site is certainly not very flashy, but it gets the information out there and it's easy to remember, trudgers.net.

Am I an alcoholic?

If you repeatedly drink more than you intend or want to, if you get into trouble, or if you have memory lapses when you drink, you may be an alcoholic. Only you can decide. No one in A.A. will tell you whether you are or are not.

What is Alcoholics Anonymous?

We are a Fellowship of men and women who have lost the ability to control our drinking and have found ourselves in various kinds of trouble as a result of drinking. We attempt — most of us successfully — to create a satisfying way of life without alcohol. For this we find we need the help and support of other alcoholics in A.A.

What happens if I meet people I know?

They will be there for the same reason you are there. They will not disclose your identity to outsiders. At A.A. you retain as much anonymity as you wish. That is one of the reasons we call ourselves Alcoholics Anonymous.

What happens at an A.A. meeting?

An A.A. meeting may take one of several forms, but at any meeting you will find alcoholics talking about what drinking did to their lives and personalities, what actions they took to help themselves, and how they are living their lives today.

How do I join A.A.?

You are an A.A. member if and when you say so. The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking, and many of us were not very wholehearted about that when we first approached A.A.

How much does A.A. membership cost?

There are no dues or fees for A.A. membership. An A.A. group will usually have a collection during the meeting to cover expenses, such as rent, coffee, etc., and to this all members are free to contribute as much or as little as they wish.

If I go to an A.A. meeting, does that commit me to anything?

No. A.A. does not keep membership files or attendance records. You do not have to reveal anything about yourself. No one will bother you if you don't want to come back.

What is a GENERAL SERVICE REPRESENTATIVE (GSR)?

GSR's are elected by the members of their group. They have the job of linking the groups with A.A. as a whole. They represent the voice of the group conscience, reporting it to the District Committee Member (DCM) and Area Conference Delegate. In turn, it may then be passed on to the annual General Service Conference in New York. We realize that whatever "authority" there is in A.A. resides in the group conscience. General qualifications, duties, and election procedures of the GSR are listed in the A.A. Service Manual. Local duties include the following:

- Attend district meetings, area assemblies and area workshops.
- Assist the group in ordering literature. A good supply of literature should be maintained. Literature is one of the most effective ways to carry the message.
- Inform alternate GSR of all activities/actions transpiring within the district.
- Serve as central point of contact for all activities concerning the group.
- Request copies of "Meeting Directory" from district directories coordinator.
- Inform the district directories coordinator of any changes with their group, i.e. – location, meeting time, etc.

We are **District 22**; **Area 93**; **Pacific Region**. Our district meetings are the second Sunday of each month (Service Sunday) at the time and location noted below:
