Step 11

Step II: Into Action

Someone once told me, "Peace is not the absence of noise, but the quiet acceptance of it." In early recovery, that saying seemed impossible. My restless, anxious mind refused to cooperate. It darted between regret and fear, endlessly replaying the past or rehearsing the future. My sponsor used to joke that my brain had only two gears: fast and faster.

At my new job stocking shelves at a grocery store, I often caught myself staring blankly at a row of soup cans, my head spinning with self-doubt. I'd take my break and head over to the recovery club down the street, hoping to reset. Sitting with a few sober friends, something always shifted. That sense of connection, that shared understanding, seemed to settle me. I could breathe again. Lunch could wait; serenity couldn't.

But the moment I returned to work, my thoughts would resume their chatter, relentless and loud.

Out of desperation, I began practicing a small prayer someone in a meeting had shared: "Let me rest in You." It wasn't dramatic, but it worked. For a few moments, my mind would slow, my chest would loosen, and I'd remember that I wasn't running this show after all.



In the Big Book, it says that God is "deep down within every man, woman, and child." I've come to believe that this Presence isn't distant or demanding, but quietly alive within me. My Higher Power isn't there to punish or control—it's there to guide, to calm, to remind me I'm safe. When I pause long enough to listen, I can feel that stillness. Maybe that's what recovery really teaches us—to stop fighting the current and trust where it's taking us.

Step Eleven has become my compass. Each night, I look back gently, not to condemn, but to learn. Each morning, I ask for direction, not perfection. Through prayer and meditation, I'm finding that peace isn't something I chase anymore—it's something I allow.



11th Step Prayer

Lord, make me an instrument of thy peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.

During my drinking years, my one and only concern was to have my fellow man think highly of me. My ambition in everything I did was to have the power to be at the top. My inner self kept telling me something else but I couldn't accept it. I didn't even allow myself to realize that I wore a mask continually. Finally, when the mask came off and I cried out to the only God I could conceive, the Fellowship of A.A., my group and the Twelve Steps were there. I learned how to change resentments into acceptance, fear into hope and anger into love. I have learned also, through loving without undue expectations, through sharing my concerns and caring for my fellow man, that each day can be joyous and fruitful. I begin and end my day with thanks to God, who has so generously shed His grace on me.

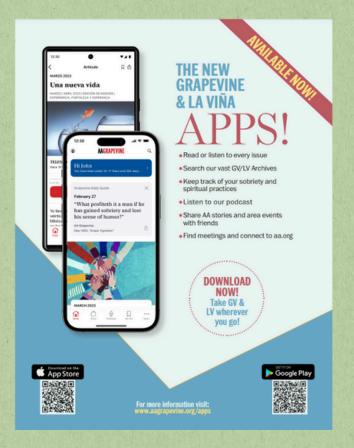

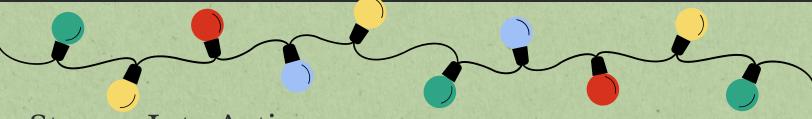

Step 12: Into Action

Step Twelve of Alcoholics Anonymous consists of just 28 words: "Having had a spiritual awakening as the result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to alcoholics, and to practice these principles in all our affairs."

Learning to do all this is not easy. To get started, divide the Step into three parts. First comes the concept of "spiritual awakening." This has many meanings. For Bill W., the co-founder of AA, it was a sudden, dramatic and life-changing event. In his autobiography, Bill recalled that he was bathed in light and seized by an ecstasy beyond words: "I stood upon a summit where a great wind blew. A wind not of air, but of spirit. In great, clean strength it blew right through me. Then came the blazing thought, 'You are a free man."

After that moment, Bill never took another drink. Yet in the book "Alcoholics Anonymous," he explains that this kind of experience is not required for recovery. Instead, most spiritual awakening happens over time in a subtle and gradual way.

"I'm not going to sit here and tell you that I've had a white-light spiritual awakening moment," says Kimberly M., a recovering alcoholic. "For me, a spiritual awakening is a whole different ball of wax —a moment of clarity when I can say ahhh...now I understand."

Those "aha" moments are regular events for Kimberly, who acts as a sponsor for several women in recovery. Kimberly's sponsees call her daily, and each week she meets with them in person. "We talk, and I can see the physical pain that they release when they're unburdening the feelings that they've kept buried down inside of them," Kimberly says.

The second part of Step Twelve is about carrying the message of recovery to other people.

This needs to be done carefully. Some key points to remember are these:

- Talk to people when they are ready
- The Twelve Steps are a program of attraction, not promotion. We draw people into the Steps by our own example. When the right time comes, they'll ask: "How can I get what you've got?"
- Keep it simple
- Our message for the person who's dependent on drugs is simply this: "I once was like you. Then I had a spiritual awakening as the result of the first eleven Steps. I have not gotten drunk or stoned since then."
- When talking to people, we don't refer to them as alcoholics. We merely tell our story and let other people decide if it rings true for them.
- Avoid "two-stepping"
- This takes place when people fly directly from Step One to Step Twelve. Flush with euphoria, these people are ready to carry the message before they've done Steps Two through Eleven.

This leads naturally to the third part of Step Twelve—practicing the principles "in all our affairs."

- For example, the first three Steps are about honesty. They remind us to tell the truth when our efforts to solve any problem have failed. In turn, being honest allows us to ask for help.
- In Step Four, we go deeper, practicing the principle of self-observation. This means taking a "moral inventory" that shines a light on our strengths and shortcomings.
- In Step Five, we take what we've learned about ourselves and share it with others.
- Steps Six through Ten remind us to practice the principles of willingness and humility as we admit our mistakes and make amends.
- Step Eleven focuses on the principle of change. We either grow in recovery or "coast" and become complacent. Prayer and meditation offer a source of guidance for acting wisely.

Step Twelve boils down to the principle of brotherly love.
